Dear Lotus Circle Advisors, Members, and Friends,

I've just returned from time in Asia where we had our first Lotus Circle gathering in Singapore and where I convened a two-day Inception Meeting for a three-year Women's Climate Resilience program in Mongolia, Laos, and Fiji, which is funded by the Asia Development Bank. Having also recently attended our Country Representatives meeting in Sri Lanka, it's exciting to be forging new opportunities to advance women's rights in the region, and to build on work that is already having a powerful impact. Some highlights from these discussions include:

- Exploring opportunities to expand women's empowerment programming, such as The
 Asia Foundation's work in Sri Lanka focused on access to justice and gender inclusive
 judicial systems, and our work in India in supporting a Gender Lab for Boys—both made
 possible with Lotus Circle funding.
- The potential of Lotus Circle funds to leverage significant funding from institutional and corporate donors, thus exponentially increasing the reach and impact of this work.
- Women's empowerment remains one of the top priority program areas at the Foundation, second only to governance, accounting for roughly \$14m or 17% of total spending in FY17.

Dr. Masako Shinn is a partner of Graphis publishing company; founder of Graphis Asia; and has held senior positions at Drexel Burnham Lambert, Salomon Brothers, and Morgan Stanley. She earned her bachelor's and master's degrees at ICU, her MBA from Harvard Business School, a master's degree in East Asian Studies at Columbia University, and recently completed a doctorate in design

from the Bard Graduate Center in New York. She joined the Board of Trustees at the Asia Foundation in 2012 and has served on the board of the Freer and Sackler Galleries, the Japan Society, and the Kennedy Center's President's Advisory Council on the Arts.

Here's Masako on why she has made The Lotus Circle a priority in her life and why empowering women is so important:

"Asia is thriving, but women and girls are still not encouraged to be leaders. They are also seriously at risk and vulnerable to violence, ill health, and poverty. The statistics are sobering, but to me they serve as a motivation. I was born in Asia and was lucky—I was educated and encouraged. But it could have gone another way. Early on in my life in Japan, I had my options severely limited by my circumstances, and eventually had to move to the U.S. to carve out my own life. That is not possible for so many women. It's thrilling to know that your contribution is being used to find new and fresh ways to empower and encourage women and girls."


Green Jobs Strengthen Women's Resilence to Climate and Disaster Risks



The Asia Foundation is expanding its role as a leader on gender and climate in Asia and the Pacific with a new climate resilience partnership with the Asian Development Bank. The 30-month program will strengthen women's resilience to climate change and disaster risks in Mongolia, Laos, and Fiji. We'll do this by

demonstrating the potential for green jobs for women, and developing and advancing gender-responsive national and sector policies and actions on climate change and disaster risk management.

Cambodia: Gender and the Environment Mapping Project



Cambodia is feeling the effects of climate change, having recently endured a searing two-year drought and, since 2000, three of the worst floods and storms in recent history. While increasing climate variability can have devastating effects on both men and women, it places a disproportionate burden on women in

Cambodia. Droughts and floods exacerbate women's existing vulnerabilities, such as lower levels of income, education, health, mobility, and decision-making power.

The Asia Foundation and Open Development Cambodia have developed a <u>series of 70</u> <u>maps</u> to help visualize how different gender and environment-related factors may correlate across Cambodia. The project takes a birds-eye view of a broad range of gender, socioeconomic, migration, and environmental variables to help identify major trends that warrant further examination, research, and action. <u>Read more</u>.
