September 11— The event on <u>Approaches to Community Mediation in Asia</u> featured <u>Dinesha de Silva</u>, the Asia Foundation's <u>Sri Lanka</u> country representative, and <u>Preeti Thapa</u>, the Asia Foundation's Director of Justice and Governance programs in <u>Nepal</u>, who shared insights and lessons learned from their country-specific community mediation programs, in addition to <u>Michael Woolcock</u>, Lead Social Development Scientist at The World Bank, who shared insights drawn from the work of the Bank, including his research on crafting more effective interaction between informal and formal justice systems. September 26— The Asia Foundation released a new study titled "<u>ASEAN as the Architect for Regional Development Cooperation</u>," that analyzes ASEAN's role in addressing regional development challenges in Southeast Asia, and its potential to play a greater leadership role in shaping development cooperation. The discussion included focus on ASEAN centrality and regional development initiatives, and approaches to Official Development Assistance, along with four case studies on disaster relief, workforce integration, human trafficking and sub-regional approaches. Advancing Gender Equality in Asia



The Gender Equality Advisory Council, launched at 2018 G7 Summit under the Canadian presidency, released its first report, *Make Gender Inequality History*, which details commitments, investments, and measurable targets that G7 leaders should embrace to advance gender equality around the world. One recommendation stands out as the key to all the others—to adopt a feminist approach to international assistance by making gender equality a standalone objective and mainstreaming it throughout all development-assistance policies and programs. As countries focus on gender mainstreaming within their foreign-assistance policies and operations, the Asia Foundation's Gender Smart Initiative is cultivating an organizational culture and staff capacity to advance gender equality both institutionally and programmatically. As part of this organizational commitment, the Foundation's Women's Empowerment Program team organized the State-of-the-Art Gender Equality Workshop in Sri Lanka in August, bringing together more than 50 gender specialists, program leaders, and senior staff from The Asia Foundation's 18 country offices. In the News

India "Comes Out," Scrapping Law Criminalizing Homosexuality

The Supreme Court of India recently <u>overturned</u> a 157-year-old law criminalizing homosexuality—<u>section 377</u> of the Indian Penal Code. In its decision, the Court cited research indicating that about <u>8 percent</u> of India's population of 1.3 billion identify as LGBTQI. In real numbers, that is approximately 104 million people, roughly equivalent to the <u>entire population of the Philippines in 2017</u>. <u>Seventy-one countries</u> worldwide still criminalize same-sex relations, and the Supreme Court's decision has the potential to advance other decriminalization efforts in the South Asian neighborhood. Freed from legal sanctions, India's LGBTQI community can now make its presence felt in the nation's economy. Learn about the Foundation's programs in <u>India</u>.



The Future of Thai-U.S. Relations

After a few challenging years, the bilateral relationship between the United States and Thailand is showing clear signs of improvement. These positive developments provide an important window of opportunity to strengthen the relationship. Changes in the geopolitical context are accelerating, particularly with China's growing influence in the region, and expanding engagement by other major powers. Given these changes, it is an important moment to reinvigorate the U.S.-Thailand alliance to be more relevant for the emerging geopolitical context in Asia. This initiative, led by the Asia Foundation, was designed to strengthen the bilateral relationship between the United States and Thailand. The project included interviews with 50 leaders from the U.S. and Thailand, and a bilateral dialogue (track 1.5) between Thai and U.S. delegations in Washington in July 2018.
