March 5— The Asia Foundation organized an event on "<u>Advanced Middle-Income Countries (AMICs) of the Indo-Pacific:</u> <u>The Road Ahead</u>" featuring <u>Chris Maloney</u> from USAID, <u>Sudhir Shetty</u> from the World Bank, and <u>William Cole</u> from the Asia Foundation. Experts discussed some of the critical economic and political challenges that lie ahead for emerging Indo-Pacific AMICs and how a well-calibrated transition to new forms of bilateral partnership may help secure their successful transition. The Asia Foundation Works with Community to Add Balinese to Free Digital Library for Children

The Asia Foundation partnered with <u>BASAbali</u> to host a translation event at Balai Bahasa, the national language agency, bringing together 25 government language ambassadors, professional teachers of Balinese, and BASAbali's linguists to translate, edit, and publish 50 children's books created by Let's Read communities across Asia. The addition of books in Balinese means that children, families, and communities in Bali will be better able to experience the Book Effect. The <u>free digital library</u> contains more than 2,000 stories translated by communities into 20 languages and read by children and families across Asia. Investing in Cambodia's Adolescent Girls

One in three Cambodian girls has the opportunity to finish secondary school, and many students lack the support and the role models they need to imagine opportunities beyond their rural villages, resulting in young people with very limited career aspirations that leave their true potential unrealized. In 2017, The Asia Foundation launched *Investing in Adolescent Girls Education in Cambodia: Pathways to a Brighter Future* (IAGEC), working with local partner Khmer Youth Association (KYA) to support 410 students, 80 percent of them girls, at six remote schools in Siem Reap, Kampong Cham, and Prey Veng provinces known for their high drop-out rates and pervasive labor migration. By increasing incentives to stay in school, and by educating students about the dangers of unsafe labor migration though annual awareness campaigns, IAGEC has reduced the

drop-out rate among participating students to 11 percent, compared to a national average of 19 percent. For the current generation of Cambodian youth, programs like IAGEC are an essential bridge to the country's future economic landscape built on knowledge and education. Curbing Sexual Harassment in China's Garment Industry

Garment and textile workers are among the most vulnerable populations in China, with low wages and difficult working conditions exacerbated by a culture of gender-based discrimination and harassment, and few institutional protections. Built on The Asia Foundation's years of work protecting garment workers' rights, our Beijing office, in partnership with the <u>Levi Strauss Foundation</u>, designed a program to systematically address sexual harassment in China's textile and apparel industry by working on three fronts: promoting industry-wide guidelines to stop workplace sexual harassment; developing stronger legal protections for survivors; and instituting employee education programs. 
The Asia Foundation's 2019 Lotus Leadership Awards in New York to Honor Christiane Amanpour and SafetiPin

Improving Internet Access in the Philippines

Despite 25 years of deregulation and investments to telecommunications infrastructure, internet access remains elusive for millions of Filipinos. This publication tells the story of how Coalitions for Change and Better Broadband Alliance introduced satellite as one of the options for the government to deliver internet, especially in remote areas. Eleven months after the Free Internet Access in Public Places Act of 2017, installed internet access points have almost doubled from 807 to 1592 and is steadily growing.
