December 3 — Join The Asia Foundation and the U.S. Institute of Peace for a presentation on the key findings of the Foundation's *2019 Survey of the Afghan People*, followed by a panel discussion on the trends and shifts in the data from past years. This year's annual survey is based on face-to-face interviews with a nationally representative sample of 17,812 citizens across all 34 Afghan provinces on a wide range of key issues, including security, the economy, corruption, justice, reconciliation with the Taliban, access to media, the role of women, governance and political participation. Blocked Drains and 1500 Cups of Tea: Making Reform Work in Myanmar

As the 2020 elections draw near, the Myanmar administration is looking to implement policy reforms to bring tangible improvements to people's lives. However, policymakers face difficulties because decades of dictatorship have left them with few conventions to support the reforms. The Asia Foundation has been supporting Myanmar's Development Affairs Organizations for more than four years to strengthen governance in Myanmar. Having approached policy issues from various perspectives and interacted directly with the public through surveys, the Foundation has drawn three important lessons to facilitate nationwide policy reforms: analyze root causes, pay attention to policy implementation, and focus on communication. Trade in the Sulu Archipelago: Informal Economies Amidst Maritime Security Challenges

This study describes the networks of formal and informal actors involved in trade, and the various ports and channels they pass through when importing high value goods and commodities across the Sulu archipelago. The findings are based off key informant interviews conducted by local research teams in early 2019 with local traders, boat operators, merchants, port authorities and local governments across the island provinces of Basilan, Sulu and Tawi-Tawi, as well as Zamboanga City. This study is part of the X-Border Local Research Network program.
