[Thinking and Working Politically: Navigating the Political Realities of Policy Reform](#)

For many years, the dominant philosophy in international development was to apply smart technical solutions and "best practices" in developed countries to complex development problems, though practitioners increasingly acknowledged that local political realities stymied even tried-and-true international expertise. In recognition of this challenge, The Foundation worked with local partners, leading universities, development think tanks, and other NGOs in pioneering a new approach to designing and implementing programs that grappled with local context known as "[thinking and working politically](#)" (TWP). TWP emphasizes that effective development strategies require a close reading of local social, political, and historical dynamics; that they must adapt to the web of interests in the policy environment; and that they must prioritize local leadership over imported solutions. The [Coalitions for Change](#) program in the [Philippines](#), in partnership with the Australian government, illustrates the Foundation's pioneering contributions to public policy reform and the effectiveness of politically informed programming. [Empowering Women Entrepreneurs: Mongolia's Women's Business Center](#)

The Asia Foundation has spurred women's entrepreneurship in [Mongolia](#) by helping to create a crucial support structure for women seeking to own businesses and participate fully in economic opportunities. The Foundation launched the Mongolia Women's Business Center (WBC) in 2016 to help women start and grow small businesses. WBC has nurtured an environment where women's entrepreneurship can thrive and has paved the way for [greater women's leadership](#) in Mongolia's economy. Enabling Citizen Access to Justice and Community Harmony: Three Decades of Support for Sri Lanka Mediation Boards

Sri Lanka has long grappled with inequities in its justice system, but the Mediation Boards Act of 1988 established a new process for resolving disputes in which panels of trained mediators would help guide parties toward a mutually satisfactory settlement. To implement the Act, the Ministry of Justice turned to The Asia Foundation, a known and trusted partner in prior justice system development efforts. The Foundation worked with partners and experts to provide an initial group of 22 Family Court counselors and probation officers with the specialty skills needed to become Mediator Trainers, who, in turn, spread their expertise to training local volunteers. Decades on, Mediation Boards are now operational in every part of Sri Lanka and there are more than 8,800 trained mediators, resolving nearly 68,000 disputes in 2023 alone. The Foundation's support has been instrumental in ensuring equitable dispute resolution and access to justice for all, including ethnic and religious minorities and economically disadvantaged communities and similar programs are underway in Cambodia, China, Nepal, and Mongolia.
