





Podcast: <u>Transforming a Time-Honored Tradition of Community Mediation</u>

As in many countries, seeking justice in a court of law can be too costly and time-consuming for ordinary citizens of Bangladesh. The time-honored *shalish* system of informal community mediation offers an alternative with deep roots in Bangladeshi tradition. But tradition can harbor injustices of its own for the powerless and the marginalized. This week, we look back three decades to a program that has transformed the delivery of justice in Bangladesh by making the shalish system more inclusive, more equitable, and more sensitive to the rights and interests of women and vulnerable groups. The Legacy of Civil War and the Power of Dialogue in Nepal

After a decade of simmering conflict and open civil war, the Comprehensive Peace Accord of 2006 brought formal peace to Nepal, but it would take years to draft a new constitution that decentralized government and acknowledged the diversity of the Nepali people. The Foundation played a key role during this delicate process, through programs that facilitated community mediation, Track 1.5 diplomacy, and all-important dialogue. Drawing on the conflict-mitigation efforts of the Nepal Peace Support Project since 2009, the Foundation's Regional Program Partnership Arrangement launched a subnational dialogue program in three districts in 2012 and provided strategic direction, coaching, and mentoring to the local facilitators. Since the introduction of federalism in 2015, this informal-dialogue model has evolved into the Multi-Stakeholder Dialogue Program, and

by 2022, the program operated in five of Nepal's seven provinces, helping to build trust among wary stakeholders and develop skills and resources within the local communities to resolve conflict constructively. Learn more about the Foundation's work in Nepal.

Indonesia: The Road to Restorative Justice

According to the Directorate General of Corrections, Indonesia's prison population overcrowding rate reached an astronomical 91% in August. This surge can be attributed to Indonesia's traditional reliance on imprisonment of convicted criminals, in correctional facilities where living conditions are often inhumane and essential prison services like healthcare and educational opportunities are stretched to the breaking point. Criminologists and legal experts are therefore warming to the idea of "restorative justice" to help deliver justice for both victims and perpetrators. The Asia Foundation, with support from the Australia Indonesia Partnership for Justice, Phase 2, is working with the Makassar Legal Aid Institution (MLAI) and city government to develop a policy framework for restorative justice services to help strengthen communities, promote healing and reconciliation, reduce crime, and prevent recidivism. This partnership has established a legal foundation for restorative justice in Makassar that could become a model for South Sulawesi and other regions of Indonesia.
